# Poster/Poetry Contest Nov. 10<sup>th</sup> at Niles North High School

Poster Competition: Students of Spanish and Portuguese in grades 7-12 are invited to create a poster that promotes the learning of Spanish, Portuguese and/or world languages in general. Winners will be announced and ribbons will be awarded at the Oral Competition at Niles North on Saturday, November 10, 2012. The deadline for submitting a poster is Friday, November 2, 2012. All entrants will receive either a 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, or 3<sup>rd</sup> place ribbon award or a certificate of participation. Oral Competition: Students will memorize a poem or give a speech according to their level of Spanish class. Students will present their poem or speech in front of a panel of judges and be awarded an appropriate ribbon accordingly: either *Sobresaliente*, *Excelente*, or *Notable*. #### NATIONAL SPANISH EXAM

Don't miss out on this exceptional opportunity for rewards and recognition for your students. They take one online exam but are competing both nationally and locally. The National Exam recognizes all students who score in the 50th percentile and above as Oro, Plata, Bronce or **Mención Honorífica** and provides certificates online for teachers to print out and give to their students recognizing their achievement. Teachers receive this information directly from the National Office. The Chicago Area Chapter looks at the total score out of 400 points and awards monetary awards to as many as the top 10 highest scores at an awards ceremony in May. As soon as we have calculated the Chicago Area winners, they are posted on our website

www.chicagoaatsp.org Schools are also sent the list of winners via email to one teacher at the school to share with colleagues. The Chicago Area Winners receive an invitation to the awards ceremony to claim their award. In recent years the Chicago Area has been able to award monetary prizes ranging from \$25 to \$100 to the top ten scorers of total points in each category. The number and amount of the awards are determined by the amount of money the chapter receives in registration money, thereby changing each year.

### Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center

At the San Juan conference, AATSP President Christine Campbell gave an in-depth presentation about the language resources of the Defense Language Institute. As Director of this government facility, President Campbell highlighted some of the features that have recently opened up to the public. Teachers and students will find these tools to be invaluable. The Accent **Library** is a collection of accent samples that illustrate regional variations of standard language. You can listen to passages covering many topics. Search results will appear with one original and ten accent versions, making it easy to compare regional accents. Another feature is the Online Diagnostic Assessment (ODA) System. This tool will help the foreign language learner evaluate and manage learning by identifying strengths and needs, and providing feedback. GLOSS consists of lessons developed for independent learners to provide them with the learning tools for improving language skills. Reading and listening lessons are based on authentic materials (articles, TV reports, radio broadcasts, etc.) and consist of 4 to 6 activities. Indepth feedback accompanies all motivating tasks, providing learners with thorough explanations and tutoring just like an attentive and experienced teacher. The Phone Project series is a comprehensive resource for locating level and topic appropriate phone conversations. Value-added lesson plans, support materials, transcriptions and translations provide beneficial tools for classroom use or self-study. Finally, culture and geography are also part of the site. The **Country in Perspective** section includes 50 – 80 pages for each country with geographical, political, economic, and cultural information. There is an additional section dedicated to folklore and legends.
